6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- In addition to conventional talk and chalk-board method, LCDs and OHPs are used in teaching.
- ICT has been introduced.
- Basic Computer handling course is now offered as a subsidiary subject to all SC/ST/Minority/OBC (non-creamy layer students irrespective of stream under UGC sponsorship.
- Classroom sessions are interactive in nature.
- Internet facility has been made available to all the faculty and students.
- Extra classes can be arranged by the faculty for the students who are lagging behind.

- Answer scripts of Mid-term exams are shown to the students.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- 3. Encouragement is given to faculty members to attend international/national conferences/symposia/seminars.
- 4. Project work is mandatory in some subjects which helps to inculcate research aptitude among the students.
- 5. Some teachers have their established linkages with Indian and foreign research institutes and universities.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- 1. All faculty members have been provided with unique user id and password of INFLIBNET.
- 2. The library is also well equipped with required titles and several volumes of text books, e-journals, computer hardware and software for conducive learning.
- 3. ICT classes have been incorporated in the routine of all Departments.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- The institute takes care of its human resources. Employees are given utmost importance and their needs are recognized well. The service rules are made transparent and they are benefited with PF, Gratuity, GSLI etc.
- The faculty and staff are entitled with other benefits like Casual Leave, Earned Leave, Medical Leave, Study Leave etc. Pay slips are given to the staff every month and the salary is credited to the salary account of the employees on the last working day of every month.
- Every time equipment is purchased and installed, software is purchased and installed, the department arranges for a demo session by the supplier.

7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

The primary innovation introduced during the last academic session was the activities of the various clubs and cells. The activities of two of these have been mentioned in the Best Practices (Annexure I & II). Human Rights Cell was formed on October, 2014 need special mention. International Human Rights Day was observed on 10th December in collaboration with District Legal State Authority. A state level workshop was arranged. Mentor, Human Rights Cell, Prof, Manojit Ghosh attended Youth Development Programme on Rule of Law and Governance in the RGNI, Chennai on April, 2015

Every year, during College Test Examinations, feedback forms on infrastructural facilities and the teaching faculty are distributed to the students—so that the College authority can reflect on and rectify their decisions for the benefit of the students. The women's cell has worked perseveringly and arranged Health Awareness Program both for female students of the college and women in the nearby locality who would be interested.

Academic Plan

- 1. Every department will have a separate routine, in which those classes will be mentioned where teacher will deliver lectures with ICT facilities like showing Power point Presentations, or relevant and appropriate study videos.

7.3 Best Practices

Best Practice I

1. Title of the Practice

Health & Wellness club is focused on creating awareness on various aspects that contribute to physical as well as mental health. Keeping in mind the complete well being of an individual two camps were performed namely 'Knowing your body' and 'Being responsible and safe'.

2. Goal

To enable adolescents and young students to fulfil their potential, problems related to health and hygiene is approached by the Club through periodic counseling for both male and female students.

3. The Context

India being home to 243 million adolescents who account for almost 22 % of the country's population who represent her future, the Rashtriya Kishor Swasthya Karyakram launched by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) supports adolescents on various issues related to health and education. In this context, our college organized camps on regular basis for Health Checkup followed by screening of students who were under-nourished.

4. The Practice

The practice involved the following:

- Periodical counseling for both girls' and boys' students on mental and physical health
- To perform haemoglobin test on underweight students
- The college plans to distribute iron tablets and other medicines required, freely among the students in need
- The college further plans to provide subsidized meals to malnourished students from economically weaker sections of the society studying in the college

Among important proposals, activity of the cell was initiated with seminars by dynamic resource persons related to the field. Also, Doctor's List for Student's Health Home provided in the college website and displayed in the college premises so that *bona fide* students of the college can avail of the facilities. The Chief Medical Officer of Health, Howrah, organized a Health Checkup cum Screening Camp in the college for the students on 9th and 11th September, 2014 through Sankrail Block Hospital. Body Mass Index (BMI) of the students was measured to identify the undernourished. A General

Physical examination including Optical & Dental Check up was conducted by registered medical practitioners.

On 13th and 16th December, 2014 a camp for psychological counseling of only girl students were carried out. The Alumni took active role in establishing a liaison between the college and the Block General Hospital.

5. Evidence of Success

Inspired by the drive for social responsibility Prabhu Jagatbandhu College, conducted health camps with tremendous response. In the health camp conducted on 9th and 11th, September, 188 students participated. Examination of BMI revealed 27 % of the examinees were underweight. This indicated a low state of health with special requirement for nutrition.

Problems of the students identified by the teachers and counsellor from "Anwesha Clinic", Sankrail Block Hospital were as follows.

- The students are suffering from mental stress mainly due to
 - i. Financial constraints
 - ii. Fear of unemployment
 - iii. Slow learning
 - iv. Exam fear
 - v. Breaking up of relationship
- From the session 2014-15 we have started formal mentoring of students with proper documentation.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

- Lack of interest/ hesitation in participation/ lack of consciousness is a bar for motivation
- As 27% of the students were found to be undernourished, lack of funds for proper execution of the project
- Shortage of manpower and infrastructure facilities
- Another important issue is the time constraint. Most of the women are involved in odd jobs which made it difficult for them to reach the college within the stipulated time when the practitioners are present. This is indeed a challenging issue as the program schedule has to be adjusted to accommodate them.

Best Practice II

1. Title of the Practice

The ICT club, Prabhu Jagatbandhu College in collaboration with IIT Bombay through "Speak To A Teacher" project funded by National Mission on Education through ICT, MHRD, Govt. of India, is conducting training programs for the students.

2. Goal

Conducting Software Training workshops on Free & Open Software, absolutely free of cost, with the aid of Spoken Tutorials

3. The Context

Responding to the initiative of National Mission on Education through ICT (NMEICT), MHRD, Govt. of India, and the Indian Institute of Technology Bombay is conducting Software Training workshops on Free & Open Software, absolutely free of cost, with the aid of Spoken Tutorials.

The University of Calcutta decided to join the initiative to bring its benefit to all the affiliated colleges. Thus our college set forth in this mission as guided by the University.

4. The Practice

- We started with the Basic computer handling classes and Spoken English classes under UGC sponsorship from 2012-13
- In 2013-14 we created a new and dynamic website and collected the free on-line basic soft training modules on various subjects in the link "on-line training" and these courses are not restricted under User-id log-in and password, so that, staff, students or parents, anybody can easily avail the facility.
- In the session 2014-15 the college authority has purchased on-line Entry-in-Service training modules and it is linked with our Website. Only students and staff can avail this facility of training with their particular user-id and password.
- In the session 2014-15 college signed a MOU with "INFINITY', a Division of Hiya Educare Pvt. Ltd, so that the company will conduct coaching classes with experienced faculty for Govt. service examination like Rail, Bank, Staff selection Commission, PSC, LIC, WBCS Prelims etc. in the college premises.

5. Evidence of Success

The club is encouraging/ promoting the use of open source software's. We have conducted a total of 10 training sessions for the students in the academic year 2014-15, for open source software's with the motive to develop IT skills of the students. This training enhances employability and

also helps to reduce the growing digital divide in this country. The club is looking forward to conduct course specific training program relevant to a particular curriculum. We are receiving good response and have created a general interest for the courses delivered till date and more such sessions will be organized in the academic year 2015-16.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Although two ICT enabled rooms with ceiling mount LCD Projector, five semi-ICT enabled rooms with projection screen and portable LCD Projector have been arranged, these courses cannot be conducted during usual college hours. Owing to growing interest in students for such courses, therefore, a separate unit exclusively for such training programmes would indeed benefit the students.
